
# Speakers



**The Hon Justice Michelle Gordon AC** was appointed to the High Court in June 2015. At the time of her appointment, she was a judge of the Federal Court of Australia, to which she was appointed in April 2007. She graduated in law from the University of Western Australia. She was admitted to practice in Western Australia in 1987 and joined the Victorian Bar in 1992. She was appointed Senior Counsel in 2003. She practised in state and federal courts principally in commercial, equity, taxation and general civil matters. She was appointed a Professorial Fellow of the Melbourne Law School in July 2015.



**Professor Natalie Skead FAAL PFHEA** is Dean of the Law School at UWA. She is a national award-winning teacher and prolific researcher in the areas of equity, trusts, property, remedies, confiscation of proceeds of crime, and legal education. Professor Skead practised law in South Africa for 10 years before moving to Australia and completing her doctorate at UWA. She is a Principal Fellow of the Higher Education Academy and a Fellow and Director of the Australian Academy of Law. She is also Chair of the Australasian Law Academics Association and Deputy Chair of the Council of Australian Law Deans.



**Dr Richard Walley OAM** is a Noongar man and one of Australia's leading Aboriginal performers, musicians and writers. In 1978, Richard formed the Middar Aboriginal Theatre which has since taken Noongar culture to 32 countries. Richard has received numerous honours including an Order of Australia, Honorary Doctorate, and WA Citizen Of The Year. His expertise is sought out by the private sector to provide Welcome to Country, undertake cultural awareness training and advise on Indigenous affairs. He sits on multiple committees and is a consultant to both government and corporate agencies where he is engaged to provide cultural advice for major projects. Richard is also a senior Cultural Advisor to the UWA Law School's Indigenisation of the Juris Doctor project.



**Mr Joseph Longo** is Chair of Australian Securities and Investments Commission. He has more than 38 years experience in corporate law, financial services, governance and regulation in Australia and overseas. Most recently, he was a senior adviser at Herbert Smith Freehills, specialising in regulatory matters, enforcement, commercial law and internal legal matters. Joseph was the general counsel for Deutsche Bank in London and Hong Kong for 17 years, advising on a range of regulatory issues, governance, infrastructure and non-financial risk. He has experience navigating multi-jurisdictional investigations and enforcement activity across financial services. He holds a Bachelor of Jurisprudence (Hons) and a Bachelor of Laws (Hons) from the University of Western Australia and a Master of Laws from Yale Law School.



**Professor Elise Bant FAAL** is Professor of Private Law and Commercial Regulation at The University of Western Australia, a Professorial Fellow at the University of Melbourne and a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Law. Her main areas of teaching and research interests lie in the fields of unjust enrichment and restitution law, contract, commercial and consumer law, civil remedies, property, equity and trusts. She is a general editor of the Journal of Equity. Prof Bant was appointed an Australian Research Council Future Fellow to examine corporate liability for serious civil misconduct, including fraud and predatory trading practices.



**Professor Pamela Hanrahan** is a legal practitioner, academic and author specialising in corporate law, corporate governance, and financial regulation. She is Professor of Commercial Law and Regulation at the UNSW Business School, a Senior Fellow of the Melbourne Law School, Deputy Chair of the Business Law Section of the Law Council of Australia, a member of the National Corporate Governance Committee of the Australian Institute of Company Directors, and a member of the Conexus Institute Advisory Board. She has led or contributed to several major inquiries on governance and regulation, and recently published the new book *Directors' Legal Responsibilities: A Handbook for Australian Boards* (2022).



**Professor Jeannie Marie Paterson FAAL** is a Professor of Law and the Co-Director of the Centre for Artificial Intelligence and Digital Ethics (CAIDE) at the University of Melbourne. Her research covers contracts, consumer protection, and consumer credit law, and explores the role of new technologies in these fields. She teaches a number of subjects in law, ethics, and emerging technologies at the undergraduate, Juris Doctor and postgraduate level. She holds a current legal practicing certificate and regularly consults to government, regulators, and not-for-profit organisations. Professor Paterson is a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Law and is an editor (consumer protection law) for the Australian Business Law Review.



**Associate Professor Fiona McGaughey SFHEA** teaches international human rights law and other subjects in the Master of International Law and Law and Society Major at the University of Western Australia. Her research areas include international human rights law, pedagogy and higher education, business and human rights (incl. modern slavery) and transitional justice. Fiona has over ten years experience in the not-for-profit sector in research and policy roles in both Australia and Ireland. Prior to that she worked in the private sector as a management consultant and project manager across Europe and in Australia.
